Irish Vets' Medal of Honor Exhibit Florida-bound

The year in review

Medal of Honor Exhibit nets Tidy Towns Honour

On Nov. 8 our exhibition exploring Ireland's connection to the Medal of Honor -- the highest award for combat valor bestowed by the United States on its military members -- was itself honoured with a "Highly Commended" citation from Kinsale Tidy Towns for a Best New Business of the Year.

The Irish Veterans Medal of Honor Exhibition, which opened in March at the Irish Veterans Museum at The Glen, Kinsale, includes the medal awarded in 1898 to Michael Gibbons for action during the Spanish American War. Gibbons, originally from County Mayo, was a U.S. Navy sailor when he was awarded the medal for

courage under fire during a mission to cut an underwater communication cable leading from Cienfugos, Cuba.

Of the more than 3,500 Medals of Honor awarded since it was established during the Civil War, more than 2,000 have gone to men of Irish descent, among these more than 250 born in Ireland. Declan Hughes, founder of Irish Veterans, which established the exhibition, said it was a huge surprise simply to be nominated for a Tidy Towns ward, and to come away with the commendation was "absolutely extraordinary."

"There were three businesses in the running, and I understand the [Highly Commended citation] was made to us because of the quality of the exhibition

space and the fact that, as a tourist initiative, we have seen several thousand people visit us," Hughes said.

As of December the museum and exhibit was showing an almost unanimous 5-star rating among visitors posting reviews on the <u>TripAdvisor</u> website.

Two months after the exhibit opened members of the New York City Fire Department, Ladder 43, visited the museum and donated salvaged items pulled from the World Trade Center towers felled by a terrorist attack on Sept. 11, 2001.

The exhibition includes profiles of many Medal of Honor recipients of Irish descent, from Ireland-born U.S. Army Pvt. Michael Madden during the Civil War to U.S. Navy SEAL LT. Michael P Murphy, for actions in Afghanistan in 2005. Irish Veterans Chapter 001 in Kinsale was commissioned in 2015 and named in memory of Murphy, who was killed in action in Afghanistan in 2005. Murphy's heroic actions in Afghanistan were the basis of the film "Lone Survivor".




The earliest Medal of Honor -- by date of action - was awarded in 1894 to Bernard J.D. Irwin of County Roscommon for overseeing a rescue mission during a campaign against Apache Indians in 1861, shortly before the medal was established.

Irish Veterans is a registered charity (number CHY 14643) dedicated to historical research and telling the stories of Irish men and women and their descendants who have served in militaries across the world.

On March 10 the Irish Veterans Medal of Honor Exhibition opened in The Glen, Kinsale. This exhibition, which is discussed at greater length in the story above, explores the Irish connection to the highest award for combat valor bestowed by the United States on its service members. The exhibition is also unique in that it features the only Medal of Honor Medal on display outside the U.S. The Medal was awarded to County Mayo-born Michael Gibbons for action in 1898 during the Spanish American War.

"El Barrio's Bravest" pay a visit


On May 26 firefighters of New York Fire Department, Ladder 43 -- "El Barrio's Bravest" -- arrived in Kinsale to visit the 9/11 Garden of Remembrance at Ringfinnan and the Medal of Honor Exhibition in The Glen. U.S. Navy SEAL LT. Michael Murphy, who was raised in Patchogue, Long Island, about 60 miles from New York City, wore the patch of "El Barrio's Bravest" to remind him and his comrades of why they were in Afghanistan. The men and men and women of Ladder 43 returned the honour by travelling to Kinsale to meet the people behind Irish Veterans Chapter #1, based in The White House, and named for Murphy.



Firefighters from Ladder 43 in New York City gathered in Kinsale on May 26 to visit the Medal of Honor Exhibit established by Irish Veterans. The organization named its first chapter after Navy SEAL LT. Michael Murphy, who wore the Ladder company's patch on his uniform in Afghanistan.

At an informal ceremony sponsored by our partners Blacks Brewery & Distillery in Kinsale, the firefighters of Ladder 43 presented us with three pieces salvaged from the World Trade Center -- a rivet, or bolt, that was picked up on the day of the attack by Danny Manning (of Innishannon descent), and a piece of window glass and a piece of steel from the South Tower.

In a presentation that was tinged with both humour and emotion, retired Fire Chief Tom O'Connor brought the connections that bind it all together to life. Cork County Mayor Declan Hurley reciprocated, bidding them all "100,000 welcomes" and warmly thanking them for making the trip to Kinsale.

Like people the world over, she was appalled by the carnage wrought on 9/11.

On her land at Ringfinnan she planted a tree for every one of the 343 firefighters who perished on that day, including one for their Chaplain, Fr. Michael Judge. The Garden has become a place of pilgrimage, solace and commemoration, and sees a steady stream of visitors throughout the year. After a meal in The White House, the Firehouse group reluctantly departed the town to continue on their travels.

West Point Alumni Glee Club visit

On June 12 more than 50 members of the West Point Alumni Glee Club and their significant others arrived in Kinsale, where the singers performed a benefit for Irish Veterans in the thousand-year-old Church of St. Multose.


